

Lovells Township Historical Society Plaque Project



The Lovells Township Historical Society has initiated a Historical Plaque Project to designate historic township sites; commercial, public and residential buildings and other significant locations. The buildings and sites must date before World War II to qualify for a plaque.

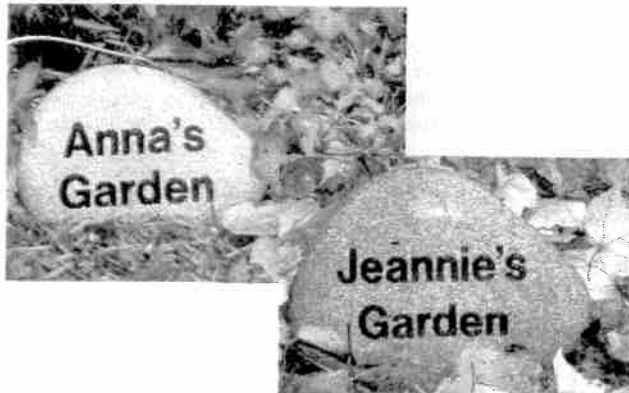
These handsome plaques are individually cast of solid bronze and measure seven inches by five inches. The average cost is \$125, but will be slightly more or less depending upon the number of characters needed for each plaque. Plus there is a \$20 handling fee. A sample can be viewed at the top of the inside door frame in the Lone Pine School Museum during regular museum hours.

Master Gardeners

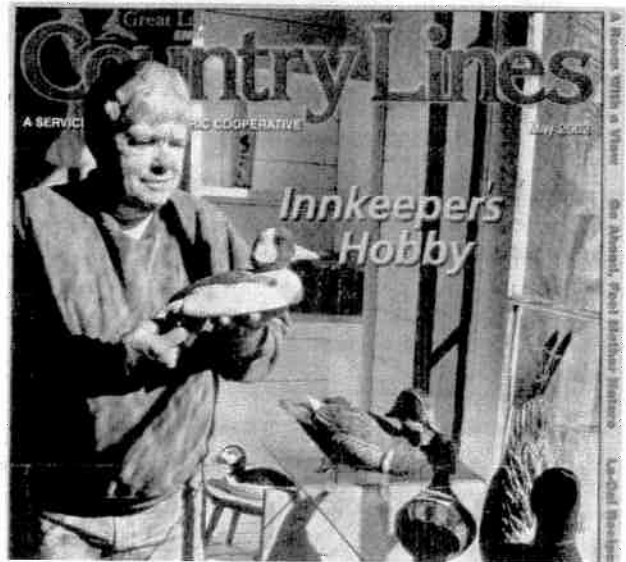
