... and what a year it has been!


Unlike "The View. . .", each of us has skipped yet another birthday, but we have hopefully grown one more year wiser.

Weather aside, the community has been fortunate to have enough "ORVers", hunters, fisherpersons, snowmobilers and visitors to see us through the current economic times. The economic times may have hard on some of us, our friends, and local businesses, but just like in the past, we'll make it through by sticking together and helping out where we can.

We've had a few friends pass away and a few move to other areas, but we've also had some new folks move into the area.

The controversy over the county-wide ORV ordinance has passed and Lovells Township is continuing to discuss issues of importance to our residents. The Township is beginning a township-wide web site that will include a place for organizations like Hook & Trigger. This website will hopefully provide the residents with access to information while here in the area as well as world-wide via the Internet



Because we are surrounded by forests and the North Branch of the Au Sable River, we should continue to support the stewardship of these areas. Our Adopt-a-Road and Adopt-a-Forest efforts help to address this.

In addition the Michigan DNR has public Management Plans for these areas. It is a part of our responsibility to be aware of these plans and to provide comments to the DNR regarding them. There are several forest sections near us that are included in future man-

agement planning. This includes additional clear cutting and prescribed burning in sections near Town Line Road in 2011. Details are available from the Grayling DNR Service Center and on the Internet.

The Watershed Restoration Plan for the North Branch has been approved and implementation phase will be starting in the near future. Details of this plan are available from Huron Pines and on their Internet website.

From the Volunteers —"Stewardship, what you can do?"

Hook & Trigger has several volunteer Stewardship Projects. These include our Adopt-a-Road and Adopt-a -Forest efforts coordinated by Otto Brantley and Bob Chumack respectively. Additionally, Gerry Lake conducts an annual Brown Trout Redd Survey and Glenn Eberly leads our Invasive Species Control Project.

Abby Smith, our speaker in October, presented several other opportunities for members to participate individually in stewardship practices. Many of us own a patch of the surrounding woods. Our management of these areas becomes an important part of the fabric that makes up the entire forest.

Several conservation practices that each of us can implement are important to the natural area around us. Butterfly gardens, rainwater management, and agriculture or gardening practices are just a few we all can do.
